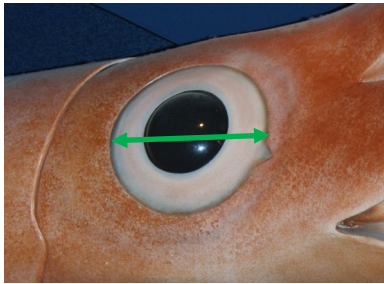




Atlas Moth

Scale - 1 cm : 6cm

Cool fact: Atlas moths don't eat. Ever. In fact, they don't even have mouths. In their short time as moths, these insects rely totally on stores of energy built up when they were caterpillars.



Giant Squid (eye only)

Scale - 1 cm : 12.5cm

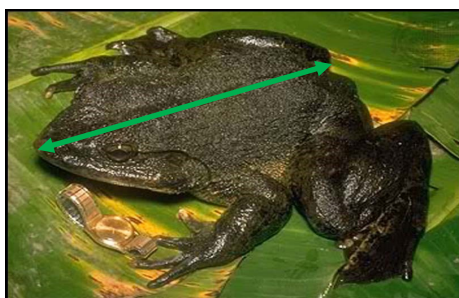
Cool fact: Like all squids, these sea creatures have three hearts.



Goliath Bird-Eating Tarantula

Scale - 1 cm : 4cm

Cool fact: When threatened, these spiders rub the hairs on their legs together to make a hissing sound. This is intended to scare any potential predators away so that the tarantula will not need to fight for its life.



Goliath Frog

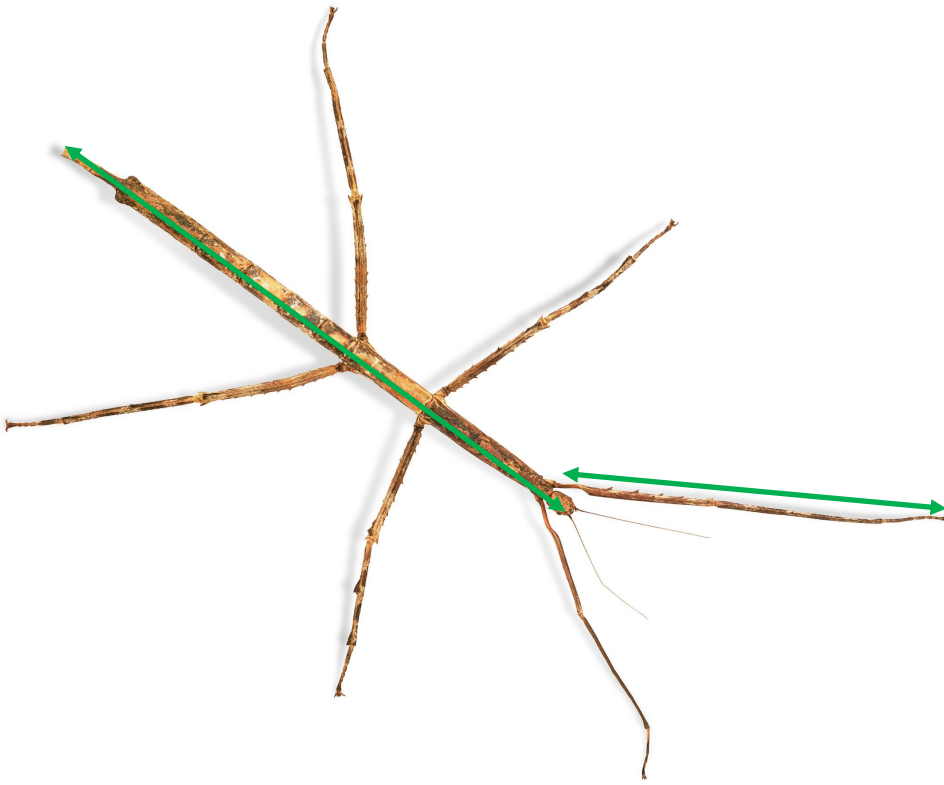
Scale - 1 cm : 8cm

Cool fact: Despite being pretty bulky, these frogs can jump up to 3 metres!

Chan's Megastick

Scale - 1cm : 7cm

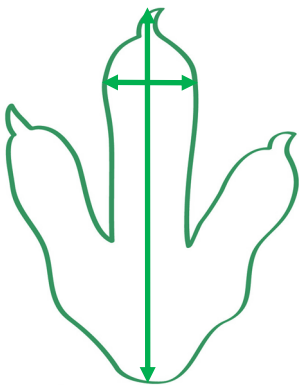
Cool fact: Very little is known about this stick insect, as not only does it live very high up in the rain-forest canopy, but it is also very difficult to find due to its strong resemblance to a stick!



T-Rex Foot

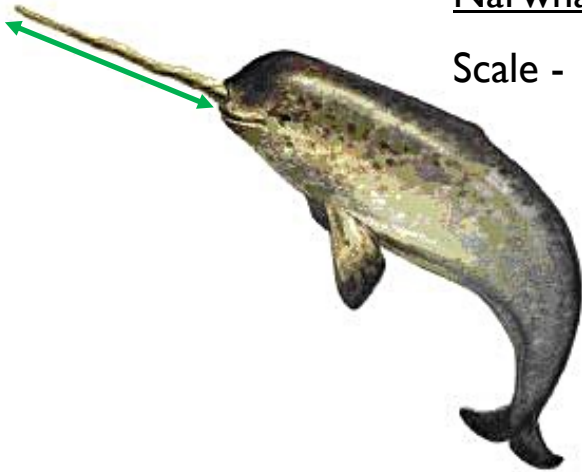
Scale - 1cm : 30cm

If you don't have whiteboard pens to hand, these creatures could be created on several sheets of paper stuck together, on the ground using chalk or taped onto the floor using masking tape.



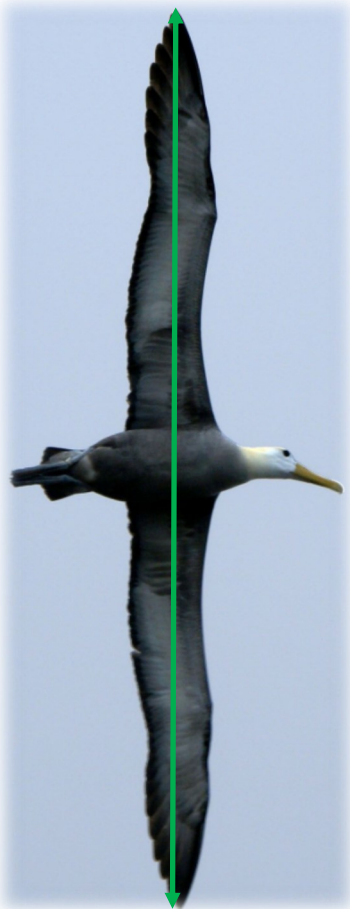
Narwhal Horn
